


SOCIOLOGY KEY TERM QUADRANTS


"Feminism can be criticised for being reductionist as it believes that all social problems are the result of patriarchal society."

Social norms are guidelines for expected behaviors, thus they set out our options for appropriate behavior. **Norms** can be loosely held, such as folkways, or tightly held, such as mores and taboos.


"Most people in a society will follow the social norms as this allows them to interact with each other and live as part of a community."

Values are the beliefs and goals that are important to people.

Universalistic Values are the ones which are shared by a society

Particularistic Values are those which are specific to an individual or family.




One's sense of self as a member of a social group (or groups).

USE THE TERM IN A SENTENCE

"Sociologists use the concept of social identity to explain how people understand who they are and why they do what they do. According to social identity theory, people classify themselves and others as belonging to specific groups."

The reactions of individuals and groups that bring about conformity to norms and laws—includes peer and community pressure, bystander intervention, and collective responses.


USE THE TERM IN A SENTENCE

An ongoing process that involves interconnected changes in the economic, cultural, social, and political spheres of society. As a process, it involves the ever-increasing integration of these aspects between nations, regions, communities, and even seeminally isolated places.

The process of pushing a particular group or groups of people to the edge of society by not allowing them an active voice, identity, or place in it.

USE THE TERM IN A SENTENCE

"Young people and ethnic minorities often feel marginalised within society which can lead to deviant or criminal behaviour."

The systematic domination of women by men in some or all of society's spheres and institutions
